Since the beginning of Covid-19 we have noticed how the pandemic has reinforced gender inequality. BOOST saw that the participation of female newcomers strongly decreased during the lockdowns. Also New Women Connectors (NWC) saw that women with less access to digital spaces became disconnected and isolated. The pandemic magnified the challenges of women with a migration or refugee background. So it's time to reconnect.

How has the past year impacted the life of newcomer women in areas such as health, childcare, education, labour, and integration? What more disparities do we need to wipe away? How can we work together to become aware of the gaps, challenges, and new barriers experienced by these women? And how can we create gender sensitive approaches and solutions?

The goal of our event is to advocate a call for action. To create

a fair and equal system for refugee and migrant women.
