ABOUT US

We Need Books is an Athens based NGO that believes that multicultural spaces and books serve several important functions that can be of great benefit to all layers of the population of the city, including marginalised and vulnerable populations such as migrants and refugees.

Acting on this belief, We Need Books has created Greece's first multilingual library, a unique space in which social inclusion, interculturalism and education are actively promoted.

- From October 2018 to May 2019 We Need Books participated in the Municipality of Athens' pilot programme [Polis 2](#).
During this time we operated a multilingual library in Plateia Theatrou, one of the city's most run down areas. It was entirely run by volunteers and through the various cultural events it organised it brought together people of all backgrounds. It offered a collection of over 3,500 books in over 14 languages for children and adults, creative workshops for children ages 2 – 17 and language lessons in Greek, English and German.

- **We Need Books Multilingual Library / Multicultural Center:** This is our new, and hopefully permanent, home! In 7 Evas St., in the vibrant and diverse area of Kypseli, we opened Athens' first multilingual library. With an ever growing collection of over 14,000 books in over 25 languages, a children's library, a beautiful little garden and a friendly atmosphere we aim to make our library the place where neighbours, locals, migrants, refugees, visitors, children, students, pensioners come to read, have a conversation, work or participate in the various language lessons, artistic workshops and cultural activities we organise.

Lessons from non formal education

- Education is a global religion + Pull not Push, Charles Leadbeater, Education Innovation in the slum, TEDSalon London 2010
- Non formal education for asylum seekers, refugees, and migrants is not a choice. Non formal education shall not substitute for formal education.
- People want to learn in a safe environment
- Networking with the neighbourhood is both the context and part of the learning
- People will learn if treated equally and with care
- Non formal education is a two-way street
- People will volunteer if they find meaning and a structured target
- Cooperation makes non formal education better
- People will learn if they are taken into account into the design of the educational programme they are to follow
- People will learn if they feel their trainers respect and value their input



more lessons...



- We need stable structures and stable people and a depth of time for equal relations to develop, and lasting relations that will lead to social inclusion
- Our model has samples of success, which will show better in the future (taking into account how difficult this year has been), similar initiatives would have more of an impact collectively, than short term actions / structures
- That the procedure accelerates and it has more chances of success through activities that interest local and non locals equally, such as sports, arts, education
